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Cowbridge School, Wales


Cowbridge School in the Vale of Glamorgan, Wales is currently unlisted. It was built in 1896 by Robert Williams.



In a small town in south Wales stands this historic former school building that lies derelict and under threat from demolition.

Christopher Costelloe, Director of the Victorian Society, said: 'Cowbridge School is a beautifully crafted building, solid, handsome and capable of being reused. Its thoughtless demolition would be a huge blow to the town. Many other Victorian school buildings are in a similar position – these buildings can and should be reused.'

HERITAGE DECLARES Climate & Ecological Emergency

The world faces a climate and ecological emergency. The scientific evidence is clear; we are on course for a catastrophic rise in global temperatures, and are destroying natural species, populations and ecosystems at a rate not seen since the great prehistoric extinction events. The 2018 report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change gives us until 2030 to avert the worst effects of this man-made environmental disaster.



While any adequate response to that challenge must meet the tests of social need, economic justice and human well-being, it will also require a genuine shift in existing cultural values and practices.
